Background:

The Cobourg Police Services Board (the Board) and Cobourg Police Service (CPS) began exploring the use of body worn cameras in the summer of 2020. Public consultations have been key to ensure the Board continues to make fiscally responsible decisions to support community safety and service excellence in Cobourg.

In August 2020, CPS conducted a community consultation on the use of body worn cameras as it relates to police accountability, community safety, and privacy. Through the survey, we heard the community's insights, perceptions and beliefs on body worn cameras, which has helped inform the next steps.

Of the 211 respondents, 94% indicated support for the use of body worn cameras. Over half of the respondents agreed or strongly agreed that they would feel safer if a police officer is wearing a body worn camera; that body worn cameras will enhance police transparency and increase public trust; and will protect police against false accusations. In July of 2021, the Board received a comprehensive report on the use of body worn cameras and opened a consultation period.

This was followed in September 2021 by the Board's request for additional information on the total cost of a body worn camera program scaled to CPS.

At a special meeting held on November 4, 2021, the financial impact of a proposed comprehensive Officer Safety Plan, which included the body worn camera program and replacement tasers, was presented.

At the special meeting, the Board deferred the decision on the implementation of the Officer Safety Plan until their regularly scheduled December meeting to allow for further public consultation on the financial impact of the plan.

The Cobourg Police Services Board Chair, Dean Pepper, Chief of Police, Paul VandeGraaf, and Chief Financial Officer, Roger Ramkissoon, presented the financials of the Officer Safety Plan at Cobourg's Town Council at the 2022 Divisional Staff Budget Presentation Meeting on November 10th, 2021, where the Police budget was presented. A community consultation on the Officer Safety Plan, including a survey on the EngageCobourg platform was launched after the presentation on November 10th, 2021. The consultation period closed on Sunday, December 5, 2021.

In total 228 people viewed the survey and 28 people completed the actual questions.

The attached report outlines the results of this consultation.

Cobourg Police Service Officer Safety Plan – Community Consultation Results

Introduction

This report summarizes the findings of a public consultation on a proposed Officer Safety Plan, including a survey of Cobourg residents and business owners. Survey objectives were as follows:

To receive feedback from residents and business owners on the value and cost of the proposed Officer Safety Plan, which includes, but is not limited to, body worn cameras.

In addition to the survey through the EngageCobourg platform, the public was invited to send comments and feedback directly to the Cobourg Police Services Board or the Chief of Police.

Background

The Cobourg Police Services Board (the Board) and Cobourg Police Service (CPS) began exploring the use of body worn cameras in the summer of 2020. Public consultations have been key to ensure the Board continues to make fiscally responsible decisions to support community safety and service excellence in Cobourg.

In August 2020, CPS conducted a community consultation on the use of body worn cameras as it relates to police accountability, community safety, and privacy. Through the survey, we heard the community's insights, perceptions and beliefs on body worn cameras, which has helped inform the next steps.

The Cobourg Police Services Board Chair, Dean Pepper, Chief of Police, Paul VandeGraaf, and Chief Financial Officer, Roger Ramkissoon, presented the financials of the Officer Safety Plan at Cobourg's Town Council at the 2022 Divisional Staff Budget Presentation Meeting on November 10th, 2021, where the Police budget was presented.

A community consultation on the Officer Safety Plan, including a survey on the EngageCobourg platform was launched after the presentation on November 10th, 2021.

The consultation period closed on Sunday, December 5, 2021.

Summary of survey findings

Over 90% of respondents were aware of the proposed Officer Safety Plan. Generally, respondents indicated that the Officer Safety Plan would contribute to community safety (Q2) and officer safety (Q3). 71.4% of respondents thought that body worn cameras specifically would contribute to officer safety.

Likewise, 71.4% of respondents believed that the Officer Safety Plan would increase accountability and transparency of Cobourg Police Service and 71.4% of respondents believe that the service should implement the Officer Safety Plan as part of it's 2022 budget.

Additional public engagement methods and resources on the Officer Safety Plan

In addition to the survey through the EngageCobourg platform, the public was invited to send comments and feedback directly to the Cobourg Police Services Board or the Chief of Police.



2. Do you think the proposed Officer Safety Plan will contribute positively to community safety?



Please explain your answer:

- 1. Cameras are good for the officers and public.
- 2. The police should have up -to-date technology available to them to ensure more effectiveness in their job performance.
- 3. I think we need to keep our officers safe so they can do the job that is demanded of them!

- 4. A safety plan is an important tool but also needs regular review and flexibility to adapt to changing needs of both the police service/officers and community.


The proposed Officer Safety Plan will cost the Town of Cobourg a total of \$621,927 over 5 years. In other words, the annual cost for the next 5 years is \$124,385 (including both capital and operating costs).

BWC Enhances Community Trust

Body Worn Camera footage recorded during a public interaction has been used to bring a quick conclusion to a citizen complaint of Officer Conduct. The St. Thomas Police Service was notified of the complaint filed with the Office of the Independent Police Review Board in October.

The interaction had been recorded on BWC and footage was submitted back to the OIPRD for consideration. As a result of the body worn camera footage, the complaint was immediately withdrawn after the complainant had an opportunity to view the video footage. In the past, such investigations have proven to be costly to taxpayers, a drain on resources both locally and by OIPRD staff and stressful to everyone involved.
